

I am amazed that with her handful of shows, she reached second place Top Lop. She retired to my breeding program after Convention and raised her first litter, and has had a few more since Convention.






9 ~ Andrew's Honey - K4 Bred by T.L. Andrews, FL Owned by Jackie Diamond, FL
