
2016 Top Lop Open Winners

$1 \sim \text{Floppytrail's Buckeye}$ Bred and owned by Teri Roch, OH





Jordy won a few more shows after her big win, and is now become a permanent mother. All in all, I knew naming her after a Green Bay Packer player would come in handy!


5 ~ Dubois Farm's Storm - DF275 Bred and owned by Bruce, Lori and Bryce DuBois - NJ

6 ~ Rachel's Rabbitat Lucia - RR968 Bred and owned by Rachel Mastrangelo, CA




7 ~ Murphy's Bruno - BRUNO Bred and owned by Dyan Murphy, PA

His winnings included winning the senior buck class at Nationals, as well as Best of Variety at the Ohio Convention the day after Nationals. He also won Best of Breed at the PA State Convention, and two Best of Breeds and a Best of Variety at New York Grand Finals. His longevity on the show table was tremendous. He is the only buck I've yet to have that won on the table as a senior who was barely six month old. He was #10th Top Lop last year in the rankings, and this year moved up to #7. I was certain he'd fall out of the rankings because I stopped showing him halfway through the year.

Bruno's presence at shows has certainly been missed already. He was notorious for sitting on the top of my carriers throughout the show and demanding attention from anyone who stopped by to see him. I think we could make an entire webpage of just the Bruno "selfies" people have taken with him. He loved to beg sweet tea, pumpkin muffins, or any sweet baked goods at shows. Although he'll only travel to shows now if I fear leaving him at home for long periods of time, he'll always have a huge impact on my herd. Much of my herd goes back to Bruno. Flying J's dam is out of Camelot's Sabrina who won BOB at the 2008 ARBA Convention.

He is a very massive thickset buck and is wide through the shoulders. He likes to be active on the table, and takes some work to strike a pose, but once he does he looks amazing. He is a very friendly rabbit that waits to greet you just like his sire, who sadly recently passed away. Lucky I have a few son's keep back out of Jumping Jack that carry on his massive width and curative of head.

This is probably my best-broken buck currently, and I love his massiveness of bone, width of shoulder, thickness of ear and well-filled lower hindquarter.
